KERALA'S LARGEST WIND FARM GETTING READY IN PALAKKAD





n what could be termed as a giant leap in tapping non-conventional energy sources to address the power deficiency in the State, Kerala's largest wind energy farm is getting ready at the Kerala Industrial Infrastructure Development Corporation's (KINFRA) Integrated Industrial & Textile Park at Kanjikode in Palakkad district.

According to KINFRA officials the work of installing the WTGs (Wind Turbine Generators) is fast progressing. The project is being implemented by Noida-based private sector energy major Inox Wind. The farm, which is coming up on 27.5 acres of land leased out by the State Government, will have an initial production capacity of 22

"It is the first project initiated in the State by Inox Wind, which generates 1,600 MW power at present across the nation," said an official with Carinae Consultants, which is the Corporate Consultant of Inox in Kerala. "There are 11 windmills (also known as WTG), each having production capacity of 2 MW. The cost of setting up each machine, installed in an area of 2.5 acres, comes to around Rs. 15 crore. Once commissioned, the machines will be operated remotely using SCADA control system from Inox head-

being used globally. DFIG ensures increased power output and reduced reactive losses," the official added.

Kerala State Electricity Board (KSEB) will buy the power generated as per the tariff fixed by Kerala State Electricity Regulatory Commission. Once commissioned, KINFRA Integrated Industrial & Textile Park at Kanjikode will become the

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quarters in New Delhi. There will be a team at the project site to take care of the operations and maintenance locally," the official said.

"Inox's WTGs are based on AMSC (American Superconductor Corporation) technology and are equipped with DFIG (Double Fed Induction Generator), which is one of the most advanced technologies first industrial park in the country to host a wind-energy farm.

According to experts, Kerala has the potential to generate 1700 to 2000 MW electricity using windmills. So far, the State could tap less than 45 MW of power in this way. There are minor wind-energy farms in Attappadi, Agali and Ramakkalmedu.

MEET TO PROMOTE RECYLING INDUSTRY HELD

recyclers and other companies who are in the waste management sector, potential start-ups and investors. Around 300 participants attended the event. They were divided into groups of 20 each with proportionate representation from all categories and discussed how a suitable model for waste management can be worked out in Kerala and actioning the concept of Extended Producer Responsibility (EPR).
